Hearing Nelson - preventing hearing loss and improving the lives of those who are hard of hearing

A focus on prevention

During one of my Dangerous Decibels class I asked if any of the children had experienced hearing loss or knew someone in their family who had a hearing loss. Violet stood up and told us about her Dad living with a hearing loss and what it was like, it had a profound impact on the other children in the class and I asked if she would write it down for us to share. Having a Dad who is Deaf!

It's hard having a Deaf Dad but I still love him. Dad was born with no hearing and he started wearing hearing aids when he was a child. Sometimes they make strange noises when he puts them on or takes them off. When Dad goes in the shower he has to take off his hearing aides. When we go swimming, my brother and I have to talk to Dad very slowly and we have to speak into his right ear, but it is still fun swimming with him. Dad can't hear everything that my mum says on the phone or hear people talk if there is loud background noise. When are having dinner we try and keep the table conversations quiet. We usually only have one person speaking at a time. Sometimes when we talk to Dad he thinks the word we are saying is actually a word that rhymes with the word that we mean. We have to speak clearly to Dad and we look him in the face so he knows that we are talking to him. He sometimes doesn't understand my grandparents because they don't speak clearly. Today my class and I learned



about hearing loss and we can protect our ears. If the volume is at 80 decibels you can listen safely for 8 hours but if it's at 100 decibels you can only listen safely for 15 minutes.

I in 5 of our youth are showing signs of hearing loss due to unsafe listening!

Guidelines for youth:

- Keep volume down to half
- Limit headphone/ earbud use to 90 minutes a day
- Wear party plugs (can be purchased from Hearing Nelson)
- Any changes get a screening hearing test

Hearing aid care - keeping your hearing aid clean and dry helps to extend the life of them

You rely on your hearing aids every day to provide you with the hearing quality you have come to enjoy. In the rare instances when your devices malfunction, it can be a difficult few days while you wait for them to be repaired. Through some preventative maintenance and proper care, you can extend the life of your hearing aids and reduce the chance of them malfunctioning.

Here are some helpful tips that will ensure you get the most out of your hearing aids

Avoid moisture and store in a dry place.

Your hearing aids contain some very sophisticated technology and circuitry in a tiny shell. When it's exposed to moisture it can cause serious damage. Always remove when showering or swimming. If they do come in contact with water, dry them immediately and bring them into Hearing Nelson to go into the Ultravac machine which removes moisture. Never attempt to dry them with a hair drier or other heated device, since the high heat can damage them. We recommend you store your hearing aids in a specialised hearing aid dehumifier. (see below) Change hearing aid batteries often.

Hearing aid batteries can cause damage to your devices if left in for a long time. The trapped moisture can cause the batteries to corrode and damage the devices. Remember to open the battery door when hearing aids are not being used and remove the battery.

Keep hearing aids free of earwax.

Earwax is one of the leading causes of decreased performance in hearing aids. Unfortunately, it's impossible to avoid having your devices come in contact with earwax. That's why it's important to take time and clean them frequently. After each day of wearing your hearing aids, take a dry tissue and gently remove any earwax or debris that may be on the device.

Change your wax filter.

Along with removing earwax from your device, you will periodically need to replace the wax filter or wax guard. The filter prevents wax from reaching the internal components of the hearing aid and damaging them. This should be done whenever you begin to see build-up on the filter. Please note that not all devices have filters or use the same filter, we can advise you on this at Hearing Nelson.

Always handle with care.

Although hearing devices are far more durable than they once were, they still should be handled with care. Always hold them securely to avoid dropping them. When changing the batteries or cleaning them, set them on a soft surface such as a towel. When they aren't in use, store them in a safe place.

Schedule routine cleanings.

While cleaning and taking care of your hearing aids at home can greatly improve the life of them you should still bring them in to Hearing Nelson to be put through the Ultravac machine to remove any moisture and dust and debris from the battery compartment. This is a free service for members and \$10 non members.

Phonak D-Dry sold at Hearing Nelson

The Phonal D-Dry has even heat development in the hygiene chamber which allows moisture to dispurse from the hearing aids and earmolds.
